





All Financial Flows from Developed to Developing Nations, 1991-2010







Private Flows by Type, 1991-2010












Regional Breakdown Of 2010 U.S. Philanthropy: \$39.0 Billion





Sectoral Breakdown Of 2010 U.S. Philanthropy: \$ Billion






ODA as a Percentage of GNI and in Billions, 2010






Incomplete Private giving Numbers Submitted to OECD and More Complete Numbers from CGP, 2010 (Billions \$)






Remittances from OECD Donor Countries to Developing Countries, 2010 (Billions \$)



New Financial Mechanisms: Beyond Philanthropy

Socially Responsible Investing Investments that avoid companies which may negatively impact society.

Investment firms such as TIAA-CREF offer socially responsible options to their clients.

Program Related Investing Capital investments made by foundations to support mission aligned projects.

Foundations such as Rockefeller, MacArthur, and Ford, have implemented PRIs as part of achieving their mission goals.

Mission Related Investing
Investments made to generate both a social and a financial return on a larger than usual philanthropic scale.

Organizations such as MicroVest Capital invest in microfinance institutions that help the poor.

Social Enterprises

Non-profits or for-profits that apply business strategies to advance social goals.

For-profits such as Husk Power Systems provide electricity to rural India by using bio-waste. Non-profit examples are Acumen and KickStart.




